very stubborn

you're as stubborn as a mule.



as busy as a bee

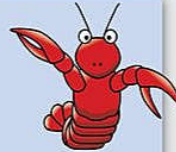
very busy

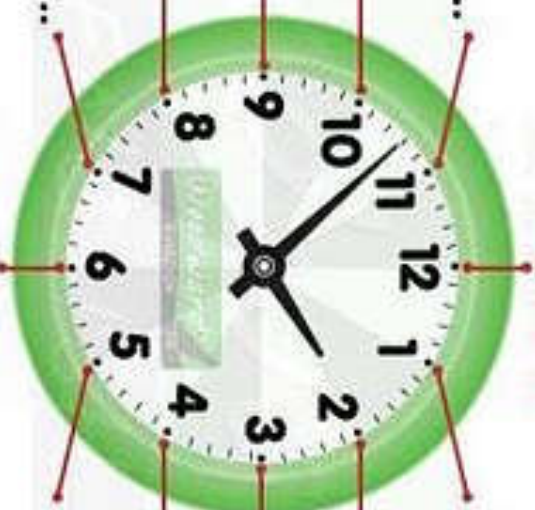

2:00 - It's **two o'clock**.

2:30 - It's **half past two**.

2:05 - It's **five past two**.

2:35 - It's **twenty-five to three**.

2:10 - It's **ten past two**.

2:40 - It's **twenty to three**.

2:15 - It's **quarter past two**.

2:45 - It's **quarter to three**.

2:20 - It's **twenty past two**.

2:50 - It's **ten to three**.

2:25 - It's **twenty-five past two**.

2:55 - It's **five to three**.

We use **AT + TIME** when giving the time of a specific event.

We use **IT IS** or **IT'S** to answer a question that asks for the time right now.

- The class starts at **nine o'clock**.

What time is it? - It is **half past four**.

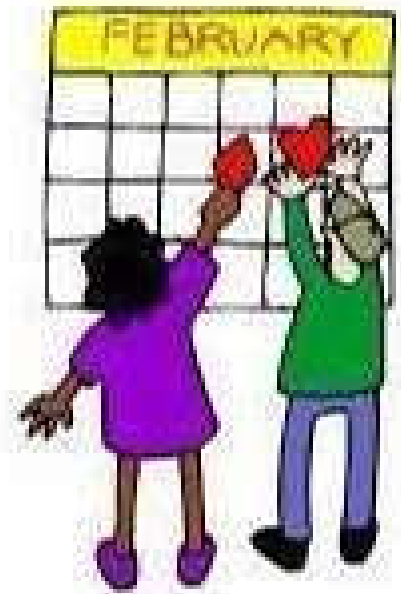
- The flight leaves at **ten to three**.

What's the time? - It's **twenty to five**.
